"The man in the crowd" - a photo where one man in the era of the Third Reich is refusing to salute - everyone is heeling in unison except him, arms crossed across his chest.

He is the one man standing against the tide - the only person on the right side of history.

we would like to believe that we would have taken the more difficult path.

Toxins in the permafrost - summer of 2016, heat melted ice in Siberia and exposed toxins encased since 1941 - reindeer carcasses killed with anthrax.

The country was losing its capacity to be shocked: the unfathomable became just another part of one's day. — mass shootings / Trump's election / 300 days without white house press briefing... 2016 ~ 2017

## What had happened to America?

The earth had shifted overnight, or so it appeared.

"Silent earthquakes" - <sup>these</sup> precede the more familiar earthquakes, and are longer, slow-moving, catastrophic disruptions tumbling 20+ miles below us, too deep to be felt and too quiet to be measured. ②

The anthrax is like the reactivation of the human pathogens of hatred and tribalism in this evolving century - it never died, it just lay in wait, sleeping, until extreme circumstances brought it to the surface + life.

Metaphor of a doctor needing us to understand our "family history" as a means to understand our OWN personal history

"It does us no good to pretend that certain ailments have not beset us, to deny the full truths of what brought us to this moment..."

Few problems have ever been solved by ignoring them

Looking beneath the history of one's own country is like learning that re: alcoholism or depression runs silent in one's family, or BRCA gene, earthquakes:

YOU EDUCATE YOURSELF

Only recently have circumstances forced us, in this current era of human rupture, to search for the unseen stirrings of the human heart, to discover the origins of our discontents

America is like an old house - the work is never done and you don't expect it to be.



→ You may not want to go into the basement to see what the rains have wrought.

Choose not to look at your own peril.

Whatever you are ignoring will not go away - whatever is lurking will fester whether you choose to look or not.

Ignorance is no protection from the consequences of inaction.

Whatever you are wishing away will gnaw at you until you gather the courage to face what you would rather not see.

We in the developed world are like homeowners who inherited a house on a piece of land that is beautiful on outside, but soil is unstable, cracked foundation

HOLD SHIT DOWN

our immediate ancestors may have nothing to do with it, but here we are, the current occupants of a property with stress cracks and bowed walls and fissures built into the foundation.

We did not erect the uneven pillars or joists, but they are ours to deal with now. — And any further deterioration is, in fact, on our hands.

You cannot fix a problem until and unless you can see it.

↳ We are now called to examine a structure built long ago.

- \* the wordless usher in a darkened theatre, flashlight cast down in the aisles, guiding us to our assigned seats for a performance.
- \* an artificial construction, a fixed and embedded ranking of human value that sets the presumed supremacy of one group against the presumed inferiority of other groups
- \* rigid, often arbitrary boundaries to keep the ranked groupings apart
- \* reliant on the stigmatizing of those deemed inferior to justify the dehumanization necessary to keep the lowest-ranked people at the bottom & to rationalize the protocols of enforcement.

The hierarchy of a caste is not about feelings or morality.

It's about power - which groups have it and which do not.

It's about resources - which caste is seen as worthy of them and which are not who gets to acquire and control them and who does not.

It's about respect, authority, and assumptions of competence who is accorded these and who is not.

In the American caste system, the signal of rank is what we call RACE.

① It is the fixed nature of caste that distinguishes it from class. If you can ACT your way out of it, it's class, not caste.

## RACE

A signal of rank on the basis of appearance (S)

Race is the primary tool + the visible decor. the frontman for caste.

Race does the heavy lifting for a caste system that demands a means of human division.

We've been trained in the language of race

Race is the visible we to someone's caste. (the historic flash card of how they are to be treated by the public)

The bones  
the infrastructure

Caste is the powerful infrastructure that holds each group in place.

Caste is fixed + rigid

is not a term often applied to U.S.A.

Caste is the operating system for economic, political and social interactions in the US from the time of its gestation

## RACE

the skin

Race is the visible agent of the unseen force of caste.

Race is what we can see, the physical traits that have been given arbitrary meaning

Race is fluid + superficial, subject to periodic redefinition. (9)

Race is a human invention, a social construct not a biological one

## CASTE IS...

the most accurate term to describe the workings of American society was not race, but caste.

When we speak of the race problem in America, what we really mean is the caste system and the problems which that caste system creates in America.

Before there was the United States of America, there was the caste system, born in colonial Virginia.

Caste, along with its faithful servant, Race, is an x-factor in most any

When we are cast into roles, we are not ourselves. We are not supposed to be ourselves.




We are all players on a stage that was built long before our ancestors arrived at this land.

## The R word:

For the dominant caste, the word Racism/it is radioactive - ~~resented~~ feared, denied, lobbed back at anyone who dares to suggest it.

↓ Resistance to the word often derails any discussion of underlying behavior ~~its~~ meant to describe.

The fixation in smoking rooting out individual racists or sexists can seem a losing battle in which we fool ourselves into thinking we are rooting out injustice.

\*it gives cover for those, by pointing the finger at others, to present themselves as noble and bias-free.

CASTE does not allow us to ignore structure.

- CASTE is structure
- CASTE is ranking
- CASTE is the boundaries that reinforce the fixed assignments based on what people look like
- CASTE is a living, breathing, entity

To achieve a truly egalitarian world requires looking deeper than what we think we see. We cannot win against a hologram.

All of this keeps the hierarchy intact.  
CASTE predates the notion of race and has survived the era of formal, state-sponsored racism that had long been openly practiced in the mainstream.

Wow.

Its invisibility is what gives it  
power and longevity.

The 8 Pillars of CASTE - the historic origins that uphold a belief system

took as "the laws of nature" → that they are → took ← distortions of convenience - as long as people accepted they would justify the cruelties + inequalities

doesn't matter if the assumptions are true (most are not)

These are the principles upon which a Caste system is constructed - whether (19) in America, India or Nazi Germany.

Pillar 1: Divine Will and Law of Nature

The Biblical passage (Hamm's son and curse of Canaan) would be summoned to condemn + justify enslavement. The US + India would become the oldest + the largest democracies in human history, both build on caste systems undergirded by readings of their sacred texts.

Pillar 2: Heritability

You were born into a certain caste

if you can act your way out of it, then it is Class, not Caste.

Pillar 3: Endogamy + Control of Marriage to restrict marriage to people within the same caste. Mating

Before there was USA, there was endogamy, said to be ordained by God.

Pillar 4: Purity versus Pollution

Purity of dominant caste and fear of pollution of castes deemed beneath it. "the race to get under the white tent" all or nothing gambit for top wing.

Pillar 5: Occupational Hierarchy

The mudsill - the first wooden beam of the foundation - bears the weight of the entire structure. Mudsill = the bottom caste that everything else rests on.

Pillar 6: Dehumanization + Stigma

A war against truth - against what the eye can see and what the heart could feel if allowed to do so on its own.

Pillar 7: Terror as Enforcement, Cruelty as a means of control

Evil asks little of the dominant caste other than to sit back and do nothing. Ordered lowest caste to do their bidding.

Pillar 8: Inherent Superiority vs Inherent Inferiority

The lowest caste was not permitted to bear the "symbols of success"
